KP4. Improving the Journey for Yukon First Nation Cancer Patients: First Nation Patient Navigation Pilot Programs in the Yukon

Content:

In the Yukon, cancer care presents unique and complex challenges, particularly for First Nation citizens. Historical impacts of colonialism, ongoing racism, and reliance on Western health service delivery creates barriers for Yukon First Nations accessing care that is culturally safe and equitable. Additionally, many

Yukon First Nations are required to travel long distances within the Yukon or to other jurisdictions to receive care. These barriers create delays in diagnosis and treatment and are associated with worse cancer outcomes. First Nation Cancer Navigators can play a critical role in addressing these disparities.

Purpose:

The Yukon is piloting a two-year First Nation Cancer Patient Navigator program at two sites to improve experiences and outcomes for Yukon First Nation patients and families with a known cancer diagnosis. Program Delivery: Navigation includes providing culturally safe care, emotional support, advocating for patients, coordinating medical travel, and facilitating traditional healing and ceremony. One navigator will operate out of the hospital and the other out of community. Sites operate independently but are working to establish coordination between the two settings to optimize continuity for patients when they travel for treatment.

Next Steps:

Lessons learned from evaluation of this program will inform future development of cancer navigation in both the acute care setting and in Yukon First Nation communities across the Territory. Further benefit from this program could improve partnership with BC Cancer and increase client coordination for their Indigenous Patient Navigation program, which currently serves Yukon patients travelling for treatment.
