KP1. Guided by the Strategy, Driven by Community: The Red River Métis Path to Equitable Cancer Care

Summary: The Red River Métis Cancer Strategy, developed by the Manitoba Métis Federation Health & Wellness Department provides a road map to improve the cancer journey for Red River Métis in Canada. Grounded in the voices of Red River Métis people with lived experience, it emphasizes distinctions-based and culturally safe care. The Strategy offers tools and resources to guide partners, health authorities, and policymakers in advancing prevention, care, and system change.

KP2. Yukon First Nation Cancer Strategy Visual

Summary: A beaded outer circle surrounds Indigenous wellness and health through the eight traditional languages. The words, translated to “Our Way”, signify the inclusion of this vital link and demonstrates the collective effort of Yukon First Nations actively working to improve cancer care for their citizens.

The cultural safety ring speaks to the competence and importance of Indigenous cultural values, and the safety they bring in the context of cancer navigation. The circle shows that connection to healing during illness as well as to preventative care and overall health throughout our lives. An unbroken circle illustrates that we are stronger together. It represents family, friends, peers, co-workers and community surrounding a person going through a cancer journey.

Inspired by beadwork, this image is a reminder of the vital Traditional knowledge handed down through countless generations. The colors reflect the Yukon Territory’s natural landscape and the connection that Yukon First Nations peoples have with the land.

KP3. Cancer Knowledge and Data – Truths and Commitments

Summary: Yukon First Nation Cancer Data is currently unavailable in the Yukon Cancer Registry due to the absence of a First Nations identifier. Our Oversight Committee has identified Yukon First Nation cancer data as a priority but wants to move this forward in a good way, ensuring that data governance and sovereignty are respected and maintained throughout this process.

The Truth and Commitment Document was developed by our Data and Knowledge Working Group to recognize the historical misuse and misrepresentation of First Nation peoples in data collection, use and reporting.

The commitments identify principals for working together in a good way and ensuring that the work we are doing does not contribute to potential future harm for Yukon First Nations.

KP4. Improving the Journey for Yukon First Nation Cancer Patients: First Nation Patient Navigation Pilot Programs in the Yukon

Summary: In February 2025, the Yukon launched their first Indigenous Patient Navigation program for cancer patients. This two-year pilot program is being offered in hospital, in partnership with the First Nation Health Program at Whitehorse General Hospital, and in community, in partnership with Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in First Nation Government.

Ingrid Isaac and Dawn Coles from First Nation Health Programs are in attendance to share about the history and programs offered in First Nation Health Programs, the current structure of the Cancer Care Navigator position, how they incorporate traditional and spiritual care in their work, and key accomplishments to date.

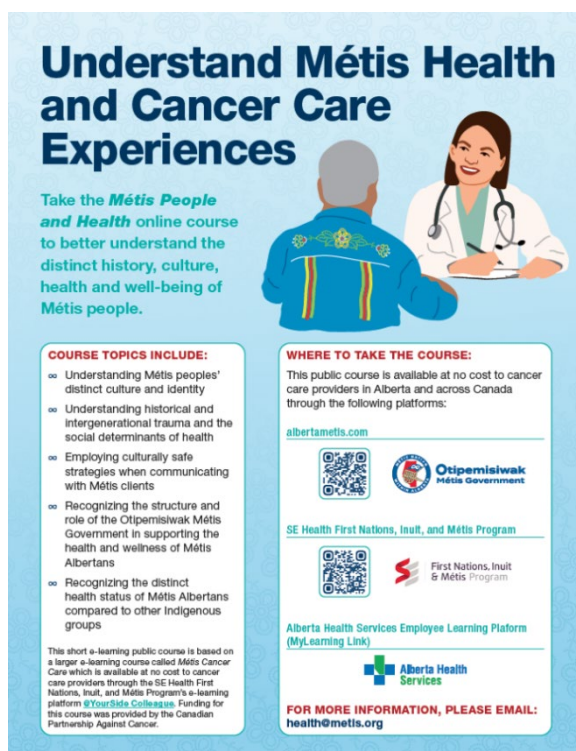
KP6. Cancer Care Course: Métis People and Health
